Off Leash - Pet Gratitude

- How do pets show gratitude?
 - Dogs: spending time with you, smiling at you, wagging their tails, turning their backs to you.
 - Cats: spending time with you, laying on your lap, purring, slow-blinking.
- Anthropomorphizing our pets
 - While we project a lot of human emotions and feelings onto our pets, they don't feel them all. Pets do seem to experience joy, sadness, remorse, excitement, fear, anxiety, love, and frustration.
- Good pet parent; what can you do at home?
 - o Dogs:
 - Snuffle mats
 - Towel burrito
 - Sand pits
 - Licky mats
 - Puzzle toys
 - Dog-safe diluted essential oils
 - Cats (they love novelty!)
 - Boxes
 - Scratching surfaces, different kinds of textures
 - Catnip
 - Puzzle toys
- Animals in shelters
 - Given extra enrichment and activity to fight boredom.
 - Long-stays receive specific and unique enrichment schedules
 - Clicker training
 - When a shelter animal is brought into a new home they should be allowed a
 decompression period (roughly 3 weeks) to acclimate to the new environment. At
 this time you will notice their full personalities which allows you to create specific
 enrichment you think they would like/benefit from.
- Why enrichment?
 - Enrichment allows animals to expend extra energy while stimulating their senses.
 - Dogs doing a scent-driven activity for 5 minutes is equivalent to them doing a 30-40 minute physical activity.
 - Cats have a natural schedule they follow multiple times a day (hunt -> eat -> groom -> sleep). Owners should help to encourage this cycle by giving their cats enrichment (hunting/playing) prior to eating.
- Cat boredom
 - Overly lazy
 - Destructive (scratching unwanted furniture, chewing plants, etc.)
 - Not using the litter box
- Pet fostering
 - Allows animals to get used to a home setting
